# Fishing the Bighorn & North Platte Rivers

### Day 1

We flew from Tampa to Denver, rented a car, then drove to Casper, WY, to fish the **North Platte River**. Casper is about half way to the Bighorn River in Fort Smith, MT so Casper was a logical stop.

## Day 2

We checked into the Hampton Inn in Casper, enjoyed a full breakfast the following morning, then drove to the Cowboy Drift-(Wyoming's premier fly fishing service), where we connected with our guide named Colt and put in at the Grey Reef launch site.

The water was high and off-color, so the guide rigged up a 3-fly system with worms mostly and several split shot with a strike indicator. Bob and I caught several trout in

the 15-19 inch range, all very healthy. As we proceeded downstream the weeds became a major problem, every cast resulted in weeds on the fly. Car trouble developed in a flat tire that was resolved and ultimately



repaired at Walmart but delayed our start fishing for the next day.

### Day 3

Our guide Colt was advised I did not want to deal with weeds again so we

decided to fish the water between the reservoir dam and the after-bay dam. The water in this browns caught on worms.



### Day 4

We checked out of the Hampton Inn and drove to the Bighorn River. We stopped

> way to fish a section of the North Platte River called Freeman Canyon near the Pathway Reservoir dam. This section provided good wading and caught

several large Rainbows (17 inches) using a 3-fly rig with size 18 Pheasant Tails and Caddis Puppas with a strike indicator. After two-to-three hours we left and drove four hours to the Bighorn Lodge in Montana, checked in, unpacked, and got ready for dinner at 6:00 pm firm.



## Day 5, 6, 7

We fished with Mike, our guide, on the Bighorn River, and caught lots of rainbows and browns in the 15-17 inch size, which was somewhat smaller than the fish previously caught on the North Platte. The water was very high, running about 15,000 cubic-feet per-second vs. the usual 3,500-5,000 CFS, so the fish were scattered, a difficult situation for the guides. We had no dry fly opportunities. Fishing was

## Day 8

We checked out of the Bighorn Lodge, browsed three fly shops, packed up after breakfast, and proceeded back toward Casper, WY, stopping at the North Platte River in Freeman Canyon again to wade fish. Here Ray caught a 22-inch Rainbow, the largest rainbow of the trip. The fish was larger than the net. All seven fish were caught on Size 18 Pheasant Tails and Pale Morning Dun's.

We left after a couple of hours and drove back to Casper, WY, and checked into the **Hampton Inn**.

### Day 9

We drove to meet the new guide Augie (who was with a difcomferent pany), put in at the popular access, and floated the North Platte after the guide checked out a few access points only to

find the water dirty with runoff. We drove further upstream to the Grey Reef area below the After Bay Dam. We caught some fish but, as we floated downstream, the weeds got worse and the catching diminished. Egg patterns produced as well as worms in this section on this day. The best part was the lunch, which was the best lunch of the entire trip, but the guide was the worst. He was lazy, too relaxed floating down the river with the drift doing 180-degree circles in the water while other anglers in other boats were fishing.

### **Equipment For Trip**

A 5-weight rod is adequate for all fishing and a 3X or 4X tippet is fine. Bring sun gloves for hand and a wide brim hat for the strong sun to protect your face, head, and neck. Also bring eye cleaner packs. Floating fly line is fine, no others necessary. Fishing earlier in the season minimizes the weed problem but you will be nymphing. Dry fly fishing is in August/September but watch out for the weeds.



We caught many large healthy trout despite the heavy water flow on the Bighorn and the muddy water on the North Platte that flows through Casper where there is public access from across the Hampton Inn at the Community Park.
